# ANNUAL REPORT 2023

The mission of the Reading Company Technical and Historical Society is to document, collect, preserve, exhibit, and interpret equipment, artifacts, archives, and history related to the Reading Railroad, its predecessors, successors and subsidiaries and the communities it served for the education, safety awareness, and enjoyment of its members and the public. The Reading Railroad Heritage Museum, is the educational and interpretive center for the extensive collections of the Reading Company Technical and Historical Society. Displays, video,

hands-on experiences, and events illustrate the impact of the Reading Railroad on southeastern Pennsylvania and beyond from its beginning in 1833 until the end of its era in 1976. The Museum is operated entirely by the RCT&HS, an all-volunteer non-profit corporation, whose efforts have assembled the collections and built the museum.

Museum visitors can go outdoors to see over 70 pieces of historic Reading Railroad locomotives, freight and passenger cars, one of the largest collections in the U.S. pertaining to a single railroad. The exhibit building features tools, machines, documents, uniforms, and many other items used by Reading Railroad workers. Model trains and a re-created station agent's office are popular attractions. Exhibits on a variety of railroad subjects change seasonally. A 15-minute video, "The Reading Railroad Shaped Communities", is shown in the Museum theater. Books, clothing, model



trains, children's toys, and treasures for rail enthusiasts of all ages are available at the Museum store. The Museum is open Saturdays from 10 AM to 4 PM and Sundays from noon to 4 PM. Weekday tours for school and community groups are available by appointment. Researchers may study by appointment in the extensive archive of Reading Railroad maps, photos, and documents.


#### Visitors:

**Museum Operations:** 


The museum exhibit for 2023: "Competition and Cooperation: The Reading and the Pennsylvania Railroads" explored the

The **Budget and Finance Committee** conducted quarterly audits of the Society's books. The records were found to be in order. During February 2023, the committee also conducted an inventory of the merchandise that the Society sells in the museum gift shop, on-line, and at various train meets and events. Values of the merchandise were calculated based on purchase prices and the inventory counts of the multiple inventory categories.

**Treasurer Transition Committee:** Our Treasurer, Jim Adams, who served in that capacity for 35 years, announced his retirement, effective February 29, 2024. The Treasurer's duties, which had become quite expansive over the years, were divided among three positions: Treasurer (an Executive Board position), Accounting Manager (non-Board), and Office/Administrative Manager (non-Board). We advertised the positions to the Society's members and to the public and various business entities. We were able to fill all three positions thereby enabling the Society to continue its operations and activities.

The **Building Committee** continued to develop the switch tower building. Work included insulation, electrical service and wiring, drywall, paint, HVAC, and foundation and fixtures for the replica switch tower. The model board and tower mechanism from the Reading's Race St. tower were relocated to the building. Visitor access to the building was improved.

Electrical power to the rail yard was installed to aid in restoration and to assist with outdoor exhibits.

Sidewalk and security lighting were completed in the Rail Car Protection Building. The museum building received

restroom renovation and lighting maintenance.

**Motive Power and Rolling Equipment:** Cab restoration on locomotive #5513 continued. Locomotive #3412 received rejuvenated batteries. Its auxiliary power unit was made available for heating engine oil and water and for electrical power. Research and training on using new painting products was conducted. A climate-controlled storage room for the products was prepared. A used sand blaster is being restored.
